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owned by Enterprise Inns their tied houses are free to buy beers from the national brewers such as Courage and Bass. But why should they want to buy beers like Theakston XB (didn't you know it is now owned by Courage) or Courage Best? Because they are cheap is the answer. The national brewers don't brew beer to please the palate but more to please the pocket - not yours but theirs, the distributors and of course the licensee. If he can buy beer for £40 less per barrel he will and you will lose the chance to quaff quality beers from independent breweries. The decline of the country pub is an issue close to all our hearts and in recent times this Branch alone has seen the demise of some excellent rural houses. We believe that the village pub plays a vital role in the community and will continue to support those in our area. As one of the issues CAMRA members care about we will go on campaigning to prevent unnecessary closures. CAMRA fights for consumer rights - your right to drink quality ales from independent breweries - your right to drink a full pint of beer - your right to pay a fair rate of excise duty

While embroiled in her operation her mind turned to beer. (Now that's what I call dedicated) and this is what she wrote:

Guinness in Dublin

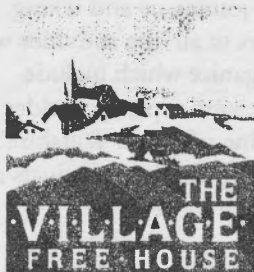
So what, you say, why not Guinness in Park Royal? But this is Dublin California and after several trips to the USA looking for the famed beer revolution I finally found it.

On arrival in Pleasanton, about fifteen miles East of San Francisco we heard that there were two multi ale bars an easy drive from the hotel. They were both about fifteen minutes walk away, but in opposite directions so a pub crawl was out. The one in Pleasanton, called the Hop Garden, or something like that was mainly a food place but had about fifty beers chalked around the walls. Every imaginable beer style was there, stouts, milds, German white beer, German smoked beer, Czech Pilsner etc,etc.. We tried a selection, smoked beer, red mountain beer and a black beer, all were palatable and slipped down quickly.

As they are kegged there is no problem stocking such a large range and people had travelled miles to visit, so turnover is good. My favourite here was the smoked beer which had a taste of well smoked bacon and would have gone well with a decent cheese, another delicacy hard to find in the US.

The other bar we heard about was in Dublin and called Lyons Brewery. It was a large room with several pool tables, big wooden tables with bench seats and rickety old dining chairs as well as a raised area for a band. This place had atmosphere as well as beer. Instead of being served in jugs your had to go over to the bar and survey the long row of pumps on the back wall. Again all the beer styles were there and we made our way through several different bitters and red beers. Once more all of the beers were kegged and served on electric pumps, with miniature hand pumps as the tap. There was one real pump, used for Real Ales that they sometimes sell, with a warning of the effects Real Ale can have on your insides if you are not used to it. They had sold various American real ales, and guest ales from 'England' such as Ffelinfoel (!!)

My verdict: America has a long way to go to match our beer, but they are making strides in the right direction. It is great to have such a selection to choose from, and they probably reflect the the strong ancestral ties Americans are so proud of. I find all the beers have an underlying american flavour which could be the hops or malt. But when it's that or a choice of Bud, Bud light, Bud ice, Molsen.....etc...etc.. then there really is no choice.

Pride of place was taken by two fonts, selling Guinness and Harp lager. So you can get Guinness in Dublin.

Villagers in Enford, North of Amesbury, have reversed a national and regional trend, in managing to keep their village "local" open. The Swan, a traditional pub with thatch and oak beams, and a unique pub sign, was put on the market by its owners, and it was feared that it would follow the fate of the Wheatsheaf. The same people had owned the Wheatsheaf in neighbouring Figheldean. Despite a vigorous fight by Figheldean's villagers, with support from CAMRA, the Wheatsheaf was closed recently, sold off and is now a dwelling.

Enford people joined forces with Stig Anderson of Bunces Brewery to purchase the Swan from the outgoing owners. The co-operative group have formed a Company, holding the deeds to the pub,

and have since leased it out to tenants. The new tenants, Bob and Phyl, look set to making a successful job of keeping this valuable amenity profitable, supplying excellent Bunces beers and other changing guest ales.

When pubs are sold, they must, by law, be sold **as** a pub, i.e. licensed premises. The only way round this is to make planning application to the local council for "change of use", prior to the sale.

All of the closed pubs mentioned in the list above have made such applications. *It is more profitable to sell a country pub as a dwelling rather than as a going concern these days!* I accept that the owners are in business, and are fully justified in trying to maximise any (legal) profits they may make, but to remove such an amenity, to take the heart out of a village, is a quick way to kill that village off.

The reason that all these pubs put forward for their reason for wanting change in their applications? - **Not viable**. This to me, means that, no matter how much they tried, (in some cases, not at all!) they have proved themselves not capable of running the right sort of venture in this most demanding of occupations. It is **NOT** the pub that isn't viable - but the landlords. Sorry to some of them for bringing an unpleasant fact to their attention, but examples abound where success-

ful people have taken over a moribund business, and brought it to life. Look at the Blackbird - once a no-hope back street boozer, now one of Salisbury's best real ale outlets - due to the enterprise of Joe Leonard and family. Look at the Dog at Chilmark, where an entrepreneurial attitude is improving profits daily - not far from either Fovant or Teffont! Look at the Mill Arms at Dunbridge (- in virtually the same situation as the Red Lion at West Dean, A small village with a railway station and little else), - frequently packed. And, of course, look at the Wyndham Arms - I'm sure John Gilbert did not envisage where he would end up today!

So let's hear less of this nonsense of not making a profit because of the location. I appreciate times have been hard in the trade, and could yet be even harder, with the government failing to cut duty on beer, and intending to introduce lower drink/drive limits, but there are still people around who want to buy into the trade, and if the pubs have failed to sell as pubs, it just underlines my point - they haven't tried hard enough to SELL. No, I don't possess a magic wand or have all the answers. Diversification, specialization, partnerships, any of these *may* lead to the landlord's crock of gold. . Darts or dinner, sports or music, conversation or cards, may attract *some* punters in, but at the end of the day, **cracking good beer** and **efficient, welcoming service** must surely be the major way to get people going back into pubs.

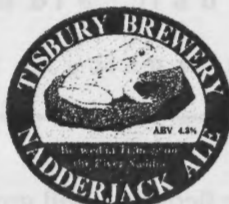

A Mild May

It may have been unseasonably warm but this is not about the weather. May is the month chosen by CAMRA for a nationwide promotion of one of Britain's traditional ale styles, mild. This promotion is supported by many breweries, wholesalers and publicans all over the country.

Many people think that milds are dark and weak, although a large number are, this is not necessarily the case with the name just meaning that the beer is mildly hopped. Taylor's Golden Best (recently featured at Salisbury Winterfest) is a good example of a light mild and Sarah Hughes Original Dark Ruby Mild (best strong beer at Salisbury Beerex) is a classic example of a strong mild.

Although mild is widely available and a good seller in some regions such as the North-West, West Midlands and East Anglia it is rarely seen in the pubs of Salisbury. However during May at least two of our local freehouses have offered a variety of milds. At the Blackbird I have sampled Bateman's Dark Mild and Crouch Vale Dark but missed the light mild from Moor Brewery as it sold out too quickly! At the Village I imbibed Bateman's (again), Everard's Old Bill's Mild and Coach House Gunpowder Strong Mild. All these milds were excellent and have proved extremely popular.

The next time you see a mild on a pub bar why not try some? It is not only an important part of our brewing heritage but can be a full flavoured and pleasant drink.
